

# KNITTING FOR A CAUSE: Yarn Wrapping for Domestic Violence awareness BY SASWATI MUKHERJEE

A colourful yarn wrapping display will soon be installed on the trees near Castle Hill Metro, created to raise awareness about Domestic and Family Violence (DVF) in The Hills community.

Led by the Zonta Club of Sydney Hills (ZCSH), the display highlights the club's continued commitment to ending DFV in the Hills. It will coincide with 16 Days of Activism, a global campaign running between 25 November to 10 December 2025.

The display will be accompanied by signage placed alongside the installation, highlighting local DFV statistics and information about support services available in the Hills LGA. The yarn-wrapped fabric, made from synthetic knitting yarn, would be made by members of the ZCSH and volunteers from other community organisations.

ZCSH is calling for volunteers to knit or crochet bright 30 cm squares. These will be joined together in two-metre strips and wrapped around the trees. Orange is the main colour for the global 16 Days of Activism, but any bright colours that stand out can also be used. If someone wants to help, please use 8 ply acrylic yarn. Finished squares could then be

dropped off at Learning in The Hills office at Balcombe Heights Estate by 30 October, 2025. The knitted squares will then be sewn together for the display.

The Hills Domestic Violence Prevention Network and Hills Community Aid are supporting Zonta in their initiative.

In November 2024, Zonta Clubs from NSW and ACT, with support from the City of Sydney Council and Places NSW, installed a yarn bombing display on the palm trees at East Circular Quay. Accompanied by signage, the creation aimed to raise awareness about DFV. This display was later moved to Darling Harbour for public viewing during International Women's Day week. Following the success of these initiatives in 2024 and early 2025, ZCSH hopes to bring the same impact to The Hills.

# Norwest takes the lead in apartment living

Once popular for its business park, Norwest is now in the spotlight as the Hills District's next apartment hotspot.

Driving this growth is a high demand for affordable housing, ongoing infrastructure projects and the expansion of local employment opportunities, making Norwest a thriving urban centre. New data from Urbis released this month, identifies Norwest as a standout in Greater Western Sydney, both for liveability and investment performance.

The Urbis Norwest Market Outlook Report, predicts that Norwest, Bella Vista and Baulkham Hills will welcome 5,600 new residents by 2040, with growth driven by strong overseas migration, increased job opportunities and major infrastructure investment.

Norwest Business Park, the local economic engine, currently supports 37,500 jobs and is projected to add nearly 10,000 more by 2041, explaining the demand for housing in the area.

Interestingly, apartments now make up 53.5% of all occupied dwellings in Norwest, surpassing standalone houses (37.6%) by a big margin. This shift is in line with a broader national trend, with apartment-living now the choice of 2.5 million Australians, more than 10.3% of the population, according to the latest Census data.

In NSW, about 1.28 million people now live in apartments, owing to affordability constraints as we witness medium-density housing on the rise in Norwest.

Between 2022 and 2025 alone, the Norwest area recorded positive rental growth for apartments at 8.8% per annum, while the prices of apartments increased 2.2% per annum over the same period. Investor confidence too is back post-pandemic with steady returns.

As against that, in the past decade - Norwest house prices have soared by 77%, reaching nearly \$2 million in 2025, while apartment prices increased by 34%. This gap - now over \$1 million - is pushing more buyers toward apartments as housing constraints continue to challenge Sydneysiders.

Apartments are not only more affordable than houses in Norwest, but also 18% cheaper than apartments in Chatswood.

"We're seeing sustained demand from both owner-occupiers and investors," said Andrew Nichols, Director NSW Development at Mulpha, parent developer of Norwest Business Park. Apartments are not considered a compromise A view of Norwest Quarter, a new development by Mulpha

or a stepping stone into the housing market anymore. For many, they are now the first and preferred choice. It now represents a smart lifestyle and financial decision," said Nichols. The demographic has shifted significantly from empty-nesters and young adults to families now opting to live in apartments. He added that people are moving away from time, cost and maintenance of traditional homes and are looking for smart, low-maintenance living without compromising on lifestyle, walkable neighbourhoods, access to quality schools, green spaces, and vibrant town centres.

Leading the housing transformation is Norwest Quarter, a landmark new development by Mulpha. Current plans anticipate 864 apartments across eight residential towers, with housing for more than 2,000 residents and 70% of the 3.8-hectare site reserved for open green space, 6,000m² of lifestyle amenities including cafes, restaurants, neighbourhood shops and other essential services.

# OOO SERVICES .....



#### RIVERSTONE GAS LEAK

Emergency services responded to a gas leak at a restaurant on Garfield Road, Riverstone, on 16 September. At about 9.15 am, police, Fire and Rescue NSW, and NSW Ambulance arrived on scene after reports of a gas incident.

One person died at the scene despite evacuation and resuscitation attempts. A member of the public and five police officers were taken to Blacktown Hospital in a stable condition after being exposed during the response.

Fire and Rescue NSW Superintendent Adam Dewberry said crews entered the restaurant with breathing apparatus and gas detectors, identifying dangerous levels of carbon monoxide and other toxic gases.

"We've got our firefighters who specialise in hazardous materials on scene. They're in the building... taking samples, diagnosing the air quality as they work to find out what the products [are] that's contaminating the air so we can determine where it's coming from."

An exclusion zone was established around the site, with authorities confirming there is no ongoing risk to the wider community.

Local MP Warren Kirby said he was "deeply saddened to learn of the tragic death and hospitalisations" and extended his condolences to those affected.

"My thoughts are with the family of the person who has died and with everyone affected, including first responders and their loved ones," he said.

Mr Kirby said he had sought immediate updates from NSW Health on the condition of those hospitalised. Investigations are continuing to determine the source of the leak.

#### **SEVERE CRASH**

A 45-year-old man was arrested after a highspeed crash in Baulkham Hills.

At about 12.17 am on 23 September, Hills Shire officers sighted a white Toyota Yaris hire vehicle travelling at high speed through the intersection of Old Northern Road and Windsor Road.

Police attempted to stop the car for a random breath test, but the driver allegedly accelerated away. Officers lost sight of the vehicle briefly due to its speed, before locating it a short time later after it had crashed head-on into a parked Toyota Hiace on Coronation Road.

The impact pushed the Hiace into another parked vehicle, a Toyota Camry. The Yaris mounted the footpath and came to rest facing a residence

Police established a perimeter and, with assistance from the Police Dog Unit, found the driver hiding in bushes nearby. He was arrested and found to be a disqualified driver.

The man allegedly returned a positive roadside drug test for amphetamines and was also in possession of drug paraphernalia and what police allege was an offensive implement.

He was refused bail and is due to appear before Parramatta Local Court charged with driving while disqualified and driving in a dangerous manner.



#### **POLICE PURSUIT**

A man and a teenage girl have been arrested following a police pursuit. About 11.45 am on Friday, 19 September, officers from the Raptor Squad attempted to stop a stolen blue Volkswagen Polo travelling east along Old Prospect Road, Cumberland.

When the vehicle allegedly failed to stop, a pursuit was initiated and continued onto the M4 before being terminated for safety reasons.

A short time later, the vehicle was located by PolAir travelling along Rooty Hill Road, Oakhurst, before being followed to a home on Welsted Street, South Windsor. The 36-year-old male driver and a 17-year-old female passenger entered the premises.

Hawkesbury police, with assistance from the Operations Support Group, established a

perimeter. At 12.45 pm, the pair and a 30-yearold female occupant of the home were arrested when they exited the property.

The man and teenage girl were taken to Windsor Police Station, where the man was later transferred to hospital for a pre-existing medical condition and remains under police guard. The 30-year-old woman was released pending further inquiries.

Police have established a crime scene at the South Windsor home.

It will be alleged the Volkswagen Polo was stolen from a home on Callen Avenue, San Remo, during a home invasion about 6am on Tuesday, 16 September. During that incident, three women aged 27, 29 and 51 were threatened with a firearm.

The Rouse Hill Rural Fire Brigade is calling past and present members to join its 85th anniversary, on Saturday, 11 October 2025, celebrating its lasting years of service to the Hills community.

Formed in 1940, the brigade has grown from a small team of volunteers protecting local farmland into a modern, highly trained unit serving one of Sydney's fastest-growing regions.

Over the decades, members have responded to countless emergencies, from bushfires and floods to motor vehicle accidents, always upholding the spirit of community service and resilience.

The milestone is not only an opportunity to reflect on the brigade's proud history but also to look to the future. With the Hills District continuing to expand, Rouse Hill Brigade is investing in training, equipment and community engagement programs to meet the challenges ahead.


#### **GET READY WEEKEND**

The NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) invited residents to participate in Get Ready Weekend on 20 to 21 September, with over 300 community events across the state. Local brigades opened stations and hosted activities at shopping centres, parks, and other venues, offering equipment displays, information stands, and practical workshops.

RFS Commissioner Trent Curtin said recent wet weather had increased vegetation growth while limiting hazard reduction, raising fire risk.

He encouraged people to speak with volunteers and take proactive steps to safeguard homes. Residents were urged to contact their local RFS brigade or council for more information.

Currently, we have nine young wombats in care, all receiving dedicated attention from our passionate team of volunteers.

In addition to the important work with wildlife, we've also introduced new opportunities for the community to connect

with the sanctuary. Two beautifully appointed tiny homes are now available to hire, offering a unique way to experience the sanctuary's tranquil setting. Guests also have the chance to book an exclusive behind-the-scenes tour to see first-hand the work that goes into rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing native wildlife.

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary truly is a community-built haven for animals in need, and we are incredibly grateful to the many local businesses and individuals who continue to support our vision. **Explore Ngarra Ngurang and know Country** 

Over 150 community members recently gathered to celebrate the opening of Ngarra Ngurang (Place of Learning), a new Aboriginal garden at the Hawkesbury Regional Museum.

An initiative of the Hawkesbury City Council, the garden was developed in partnership with the Dharug Custodian Aboriginal Corporation, Merana Aboriginal Community Association and members of the Dharug community members. It is a space for learning, storytelling and connection - a living space that honours Aboriginal knowledge, traditional plant use and the Dharug people's deep connection to Country.

The opening ceremony featured a Welcome to Country by Dharug woman Rhiannon Wright,



along with her daughters Lyra and Zara Walsh. A Smoking Ceremony was led by Uncle Chris Tobin followed by a vibrant performance from the Dhangurru Nura Dance group (Merana).

The first stage in the development of the garden included design, landscaping, cultural signage, and community consultation. A range of native plants—traditionally used by the Dharug people for food, medicine, fibre, and tools—were sourced from multiple locations across the region to reflect local biodiversity and cultural heritage.

Along the front fence, a vibrant artwork by Dharug artist Leanne Watson Redpath celebrates local flora and fauna. Integrated laser-cut metal panels depict Dharug storytelling elements such as meeting places, birds, and plants—symbolizing the deep connection between sky, land and people.

"May this garden be a place of respect, reflection and shared learning for generations to come," said Les Sheather, Hawkesbury City Mayor. He hailed it as a symbol of collaboration – between many partners who shared their wisdom to make this garden a



reality. He highlighted the role of learning in bringing everyone together.

A Stage 2 development has also been planned for the garden with focus on expanding access to the site and creating a school education program aligned to the NSW curriculum. It will also include additional interpretation to deepen cultural learning experiences.

Funded by the NSW Government and Hawkesbury City Council, Ngarra Ngurang will continue to grow as a place for education, community gatherings, and quiet reflection—supporting healing and intergenerational knowledge-sharing.

#### Notice of intention to grant a licence under section 151 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974

## Public consultation on the proposal to grant a licence is open until 20 October 2025.

The proposed grant of licence is to Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited ACN 623 275 196 for the building known as Farm Manager's House, located on Memorial Drive, Scheyville National Park. The proposed licence area includes Farm Manager's House and fenced yard area (see Figure 1).

Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited has an existing occupation licence for some of the buildings and outdoor areas within Scheyville Camp Precinct and an existing licence for Long Tan Place House. The Scheyville Camp Precinct licence permits the operation of a public museum and associated community activities, and the Long Tan Place house licence permits refurbishment works and subsequent occupation as a residence for a caretaker.

The proposed licence would enable Hunter Anzac Memorial Limited to undertake refurbishment works to Farm Manager's House before use as an office to support its museum operation.

The initial term of the proposed licence concludes on 20 February 2035 and has two option terms of five-years (potential total term of approximately 20 years).

## Hawkesbury Roundtable Discuss Flood Insurance Issues

Hawkesbury residents, businesses and government representatives met with the insurance sector recently to discuss the ongoing challenges of flood insurance in the region.

The sessions, organised by Federal Member for Macquarie Susan Templeman, brought local voices directly to Insurance Council of Australia (ICA) CEO Andrew Hall, while exploring options for improving the availability and affordability of cover.

Assistant Treasurer and Minister for Financial Services Daniel Mulino addressed the afternoon roundtable, which also included Hawkesbury Mayor Les Sheather, Council staff, NSW Reconstruction Authority, Turf NSW and other stakeholders.

Ms Templeman said home insurance had become a crisis for many families living on the flood plain. "The consequences of the last few years of flooding have changed the dynamic for home owners in parts of the Hawkesbury and Nepean, with too many people priced out of the flood insurance market," she said.

"For residents who regularly flood, insurance without flood cover has implications for their mortgages, their future sales options and their sense of security."

She said the insurance sector's message was clear: premiums could only fall if risk was reduced, which required mitigation measures supported by all levels of government.

Homeowners also expressed a desire to retrofit properties with resilient features to help reduce clean-up costs after floods, though many residents cannot afford such upgrades. Heritage properties, Ms Templeman noted, often require tailored approaches.

Mr Hall outlined examples of flood insurance models from overseas, pointing out weaknesses and lessons for Australia. He also highlighted the need to learn from local cases such as Lismore buy-backs, stressing the importance of avoiding long-term negative impacts when some residents leave while others stay.

The role of state and local governments was discussed, particularly in identifying locally appropriate mitigation projects.

At the federal level, the \$1 billion Disaster Ready Fund was raised, alongside work by the NSW Reconstruction Authority, which is preparing the Hawkesbury Nepean Valley Disaster Adaptation Plan.

The NSW Government's policy to eventually lower Warragamba Dam's level was also noted.

Ms Templeman said there are no quick fixes but pledged to keep the issue on the agenda, working with Minister Mulino and the sector to address gaps in the insurance market.

She encouraged residents struggling to secure affordable cover to contact her office for support and to explore options with locally based insurers.

# Macquarie Park now summer-ready by SASWATI MUKHERJEE

The renewal of the popular riverside recreation area,
Macquarie Park at Freemans Reach is now complete, offering
recreational facilities and amenities for visitors across age groups.

This major upgrade was funded through a joint investment of nearly \$2 million, including the NSW Government's Places to Swim program (\$839,400), Australian and NSW Government's Community Assets Program (\$600,000) under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements and a \$550,000 contribution from Hawkesbury City Council.

New picnic areas adjacent to the riverbank now offer shade, seating, timber daybeds, tables, barbeques and drinking fountains. An emergency ramp has been added to ensure quicker access for SES, Ambulance and Police services. The existing picnic area has been upgraded too, with new table settings and more shade.

The playspace is now better suited to be a regional park – it now offers a new water play area, a nature play creek bed, a basket swing, a rope canoe swing spinner and nature balance play.

Keeping safety paramount, the park now has upgraded safety signage and water quality advice in place – to have fun responsibly.

Federal Member for Macquarie Susan Templeman said the investment opens up the riverbank for better community use.

"It's pretty special to have such a beautiful location to relax and play in, so close to Windsor, and I know local businesses will be pleased to see people returning after many years of flood damage. It's a great example of 'building back better' after a disaster," she said.

Federal Minister for Emergency Management, Kristy McBain said the renewal of Macquarie Park marks a significant milestone on the region's path to recovery. He acknowledged the State Government's and Council's effort in delivering positive outcomes for the community.

Minister for Planning and Public Spaces
Paul Scully said the upgrades have provided a
space to the Hawkesbury community to cool
off this summer – with additional shade and an
interactive kids splash park.

Minister for Regional NSW Tara Moriarty said Macquarie Park is now a major visitor attraction rebuilt to better withstand future flooding along the Hawkesbury River.

"I'm pleased that the Australian and NSW Governments have been able to support Hawkesbury City Council to deliver a park and community space that brings people together, supports tourism, boosts preparedness, and is more resilient to future natural disasters," said Ms Moriarty.

Hawkesbury City Mayor Les Sheather said the works have breathed new life into the popular park.

"Whether you are looking for an active family day out, a place to exercise or relax in the sun with friends, Macquarie Park is now one of Hawkesbury's premier destinations," said Mayor Sheather.

Presently, major upgrades are underway across Hawkesbury's parks and sports fields to support active, healthy living for the community.

The upgrades were part of Macquarie Park Masterplan and Plan of Management, developed from community feedback in 2020 and adopted by Council in August 2023.

Council will host the official opening of this space on Sunday, 9 November 2025 from 9 am to 12 noon, where visitors can enjoy donuts, coffee, ice cream and kids can enjoy various activities too.



## Minns Government Ignores Box Hill

Recently in Parliament we debated an important issue that impacts The Hills Shire Local Government Area (LGA) including Box Hill. The Fight for a Fairer Hills Future petition, launched by The Hills Shire Council attracted over 20,000 signatures and came up for debate. The petition called for the NSW Labor Government to inject funding for infrastructure projects in one of the fastest-growing areas in the state - Box Hill.

I had the honour of speaking on the petition along with my Liberal Parliamentary colleagues Mark Hodges MP, Member for Castle Hill and Ray Williams MP, Member for Kellyville, as we fought for better infrastructure that our communities deserve. The Hills Shire LGA is already doing its fair share of heavy lifting when it comes to housing and sadly the supporting infrastructure is not keeping pace with that growth. The Minns Government put their hand up to be elected with the promise to address any shortfalls, but they have not stood up for the good people of Box Hill, where there is an infrastructure deficit of \$207 million.

Our families in Box Hill are missing signalised traffic intersections, roundabouts, bridges, road widening and shared paths. How can Premier Minns ignore the needs of such a deserving community while he finds the funds for Labor seats? It's time this



government did some heavy lifting. Please know that I will continue to advocate so that we get our fair share of the cake.

## **Cheaper Home Batteries For Our Community**

Imagine how much energy is needed to toast 420,000 slices of bread, display 42,000 hours of Netflix, or fully charge nearly 900,000 iPhones? Well, this is how much energy has already been installed here in Greenway through the cheaper home batteries scheme.

Labor went to the election with a promise to make home batteries more affordable for Western Sydney households, and we are delivering on that commitment. On July 1 our Cheaper Home Batteries program commenced and has since delivered over 50,000 installations across the country, including over 4,200 in Western Sydney.

The Cheaper Home Batteries program reduces the cost of a typical home battery installation by around 30% – a saving of roughly \$4,000. For households with existing rooftop

solar, that delivers savings of up to \$1,100 a year on power bills, while families installing new solar and battery systems can save up to \$2,300 a year.

Locals in our community care about Australia's clean energy future, but they also want to cut their power bills and reduce their reliance on the grid. This program delivers both, and it's been fantastic to see the strong uptake in our area. In fact, the highest take-up of cheaper home batteries isn't in inner cities, but in our outer suburbs and regional areas. This is no surprise, with 10 times more solar rooftop panels in Blacktown than Bondi.

In the first half of 2025, rooftop solar accounted for 12.8% of Australia's electricity generation – up from just 6% in 2020 – and

our Government is working to expand access to cheaper and cleaner energy. We're investing \$100 million through the Solar Banks program to provide shared solar systems for over 25,000 apartments and rental properties. We're also delivering upgrades to more than 100,000 social housing properties, including solar, batteries, and energy-efficiency improvements, lowering power bills for those who need it most.

Programs like these show that transitioning to clean energy doesn't just protect our environment, it strengthens communities, helps household budgets, and empowers Australians to take control of their energy future. I am proud that our community in North West Sydney is leading the way, proving that sustainability and affordability can go hand in hand.

## **Springle Robotics Brings** a touch of the future to the Hills BY LANCE ZAFE

Robots are no longer confined to science fiction or factory floors. In the Hills, they are beginning to appear in cafés, libraries and aged care centres.

Behind the move is Springle Robotics, a local startup founded by Hills resident Shyni Shyamsunder. The company is exploring how service robots can support staff, reduce repetitive work, and create playful moments that spark community connection.

"I've always been fascinated by innovation, and I believe the future workforce won't just be people, it will be people and robots working together," Shyamsunder said. "Rather than fear that shift, we need to embrace it."

Springle's robots are designed with personality in mind. Each has its own name, guirks and style, far from being faceless machines. One of their



signature models, Kikato, is described as a "senior hospitality delivery and branding expert."

Kikato is cheerful, polite, and ready to deliver meals and drinks without complaint. Other robots can sing, dance or play music, adding unexpected charm to their daily tasks.

In aged care centres, the robots can deliver essentials or meals, freeing up staff to spend more time with residents. In libraries, they can move and organise books. In restaurants, they run orders from kitchen to table. And in shopping centres, they can host interactive campaigns or guide visitors.

The Hills Shire Council has been closely involved in the startup's journey. After Shyamsunder shared her vision with councillors and staff, the Council's Economic Development and Innovation team helped connect Springle with businesses across the area.

That support has led to pilots in local venues and early conversations about where robots might add value next. According to Shyamsunder, the initial response is often curiosity mixed with hesitation. But that quickly changes once staff and customers see the robots in action.



"What we've seen consistently is this: once businesses actually use a robot, their hesitation turns into excitement," she said. "Staff often go from 'Will this really work?' to 'When can we get another one?' very quickly."

For the founder, the goal isn't to replace people but to ease their workload.

"Our robots are designed to support, not replace. They take care of repetitive tasks so staff can focus on what really matters - customer service, human connection, and adding value."

Looking ahead, Shyamsunder sees robots becoming part of everyday life across the Hills, from schools and supermarkets to aged care and hospitality.

"Our vision is simple but powerful: to use technology to serve people and strengthen our community, starting right here at home," she said.

They are inviting businesses to reach out for a two-week trial, with no cost except the robot transport via springlerobotics.com.au.



## BIRD OBSERVATION

One of the most engaging activities that can be undertaken in bushland or wetland environments is to observe those birds which frequent that immediate locality. Experienced bushwalkers keep a particular eye out for any birds they may encounter along the way.

However, there are dedicated people whose main focus when out in bushland is to concentrate solely on the birdlife around them.

For these enthusiastic people, "discovering" a new bird that they have not seen before can be a very satisfying experience.

There are a number of strategies that can be adopted for others who may find bird watching an interesting pastime.

In order to "get up close and personal" with small birds who occupy the undergrowth as well as the canopy, a powerful pair of binoculars would be essential. A comprehensive field guide is also very useful when helping to identify most birds. Appropriate clothing and footwear for the bird watcher is also advisable.

Aspects to consider when attempting to determine the type of any bird being observed, is to consider its size and colour, the shape of its head and beak, the colour and length of its legs, as well as any call that can be heard.

Being as inconspicuous as possible is advantageous, as birds, especially small ones, are very wary of unusual movement nearby. Being quiet and patient lessens any disturbance that may interrupt the process of observing the interesting habits of the bird being watched.

For Master Lo, the festival held deep personal meaning.

"For me personally, it meant the world, as we finally have a day to specifically celebrate our martial arts traditions," he said.

## **SUNDAY DRIVE**

It's Spring and it's Sunday. So much to do and see, open gardens, festivals and fetes and even open house at some of Sydney's historical properties. My diary is filling up with invitations to see and experience a wealth of beauty around this great city of ours. Well that is what is happening at our place this week.

Actually as I am writing this it is not yet Sunday, but Saturday and my mind has wandered back (as it often tends to do now) to years past. I am recalling the days when the roads were less busy on weekends, shops were closed on Sundays and even Saturday afternoons, when there were less people around and everyone seemed to know everyone else in the neighbourhood. Back in the day when people would go for a "Sunday drive" often to outlying rural areas or to the beach, when dad would load the family into the family car (remember when there was usually only one car in the household?) and off we would go.

Dad would often ensure that the fuel tank in the car had sufficient fuel for the trip because many service stations were not open on Sundays. The Esky and picnic tables or blankets would be loaded into the boot of the car. There would be sandwiches or salads prepared by mum, some soft drink and maybe some beer in the Esky. The family including the dog would pile inside the car after deciding on a location to head for.

I am generalising in these recollections. Actually the dog did not join us in these drives back in the late 1950's or early '60s. Different families may have different memories of such drives. As a child we would be taken to such exotic places as Bobbin Head or Coal & Candle Creek at Ku-Ring-Gai Chase National Park. We would look for a vacant picnic hut or table if we could otherwise it would be "get out the table or blanket from the boot of the car". You would kick a soccer ball around, dangle a fishing line in the river or creek, or just go for a little walk.

Some family outings for some families I knew at the time would go as far as the nearest country pub that was open on a Sunday (pubs generally in Sydney were closed on Sundays). Country pubs were open for bona-fide travellers so that many pubs on what was then just outside the fringe of Sydney's metropolitan area were very popular. The Cross Roads Hotel , just outside Liverpool or the Log Cabin at Penrith and the pub at Brooklyn are some that come to mind as being popular with Sydney's Sunday drivers.

As I got older and obtained my own car I often took Sunday drives along country roads to places such as Cobbitty, Camden, Campbelltown and Appin. Later Sunday drives after marriage would include visits to garden nurseries along what was then countrified Old Northern Rd at Castle Hill, Dural and Galston or perhaps a drive out to Windsor or the Blue Mountains.

Mostly now though my Sunday drives are just as often on a weekday avoiding the weekend traffic of mums and dads taking their kids to sporting events or out shopping now that stores are open seven days a week



Adam is one of the brightest young referees in the Parramatta District Rugby League, having already bagged three prestigious awards, including Junior Of The Year in 2024.

Aged just 16, the Hills local underlined his growing presence among the referees by being the youngest-ever touch judge to officiate at the recent Parramatta district number one game in Kellyville.

Adam, who attends Parramatta High School, is in his third year of refereeing, having played for Wenty Magpies for a few seasons.

"I stopped playing league because I wanted to try something different and see the other perspectives of the game," Adam said. "When I first started refereeing, I used to make a lot of mistakes, but I am more experienced now,


